# **Requirements of the Annual Report**

Texas Education Code §39.053 requires each district's Board of Trustees to publish an annual report that includes:

- Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) Report
- Campus performance objectives
- Report of violent or criminal incidents
- Information received under TEC §51.403(e) from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board

The Board of Trustees shall hold a hearing for public discussion of the report, and they shall widely disseminate the report within the district.

The 2010-11 school year marks the last "full" year of Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) testing.

Beginning in 2011-12, students in grades 3-9 will take the new State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR).

Students who entered high school in school year 2010-11 or earlier will continue to take TAKS to meet their graduation requirements.

Subsequent classes must pass STAAR end-ofcourse exams to fulfill their graduation requirements.





# **2011 State Accountability**


### Significant changes to the state accountability system in 2011:



- The standards for Academically Acceptable performance increased by 5 percentage points in math and science to 65% and 60%, respectively.
- Two new performance indicators were required for reaching Exemplary or Recognized status:
  - ELL Progress Measure
  - Commended Performance Indicator
- Texas Projection Measure (TPM) was eliminated.
- Results of modified assessments taken by students with disabilities were included for all grades and subjects.



# **Class of 2010 4-Year Completion Rate**




Standard Accountability Measures:

Annual Dropout Rate – 0.3% Same as prior year. Grades 7-8 (School Year 2009-10)








# AISD TAKS Performance 2003-2011

Over the course of the TAKS assessments, 2003 through 2011, AISD students made gains of 17 or more percentage points in all five subject areas.

The largest gains were in science, with a gain of 39 percentage points, and mathematics, with a gain of 30 percentage points.

### Percent Met Standard – All Students Group






# TAKS Commended Performance 2003-2011

In 2011, the percentage of students achieving Commended Performance reached 30% or more in all five subject areas for the first time.

Over the course of the TAKS assessments, 2003-2011, the percentage of students achieving Commended Performance increased by 17 percentage points or more in every subject.


As required by the Texas Education Code and the TEA, the 2010-11 Annual Report includes a report on violent and criminal incidents at our schools.

# Accountability 2012 and Beyond

School year 2011-12

- STAAR/EOC tests will be administered to students in grades 3-8 and students entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade for the first time.
  - $\circ$  For grades 3-8, STAAR tests are in the same grades and subjects as STAAR.
  - $\circ$  For high school, twelve End-of-Course exams replace 10 grade level TAKS tests
- No new state ratings will be issued. Campus and district ratings from 2011 will carry forward for SY 2012-13.
- Federal AYP ratings will be based on STAAR results at TAKS performance levels for grades 3-8 and TAKS results at grade 10
  - $^{\circ}$  AYP performance standards will increase from 80 to 87 percent in reading and from 75 to 83 percent in math.
  - For the first time, all seven student groups will be evaluated on Graduation Rate.

School year 2012-13

- Campuses and districts will be evaluated under the new STAAR accountability system for the first time in 2013
  - o Only the labels of Acceptable or Unacceptable will be awarded in the first year of the new system
  - New system will be developed over the next eighteen months and will be very different from the existing system
    - Additional indicators will be used

School year 2013-14

- Campus and district distinction levels (i.e. Exemplary/Recognized) will be awarded for the first time
  - Higher ratings will be based on higher levels of student performance (post-secondary readiness)
