Overview of School Name History

- John T. Allan facility (former Allan Elementary), named for John T. Allan, an officer in the Confederate Army. Allan was born in Scotland and was a district attorney before he became Texas state treasurer. He was a board member at the Texas School for the Deaf.
- Fulmore Middle School, named for Zachary Taylor Fulmore, a private in the Confederate Army. Fulmore, a lawyer, was a Travis County judge. He also was a board member at the Texas School for the Blind. Along with his one-time law partner, Fulmore helped in the campaign for public schools in Austin and was a longtime school board member. He was a chairman of the board at the Texas Confederate Home.
- Lanier High School, named for Sidney Lanier, a noted poet and musician who fought for the Confederacy. Lanier, a Georgia native, practiced law with his father. He wrote an anti-war memoir about his service in the Confederate Army.
- Reagan High School, named for John H. Reagan, the Confederacy's postmaster general. Reagan was a Texas Democratic Party leader. In May 1865, Reagan was captured and placed in solitary confinement at Fort Warren in Boston harbor. He returned to Texas after his release.
- Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston campus, named for Confederate Gen. Albert S. Johnston. He was killed in 1862 at the Battle of Shiloh. First buried in New Orleans, his remains were transferred for burial in the Texas State Cemetery in Austin.

John T. Allan Facility

- The building was completed in 1900. It was used as Austin High School until 1925, when it became the John T. Allan Junior High School. The Junior High School was named in John T. Allan's honor by the school board in recognition of a \$5000 endowment to establish a school of industrial arts for boys. Classes were held there until 1956, when the school was destroyed by fire. A State of Texas Subject Marker was placed on the site in 1981 by the Texas Historical Commission.
- Allan was born in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1821. He came to the U.S. in 1821 and to Austin in 1850. He originally opened a furniture store in Austin but then, having studied law in Little Rock, decided to practice and later became a justice of the peace. He served as a confederate officer during the Civil War. Afterwards he served as state treasurer and later district attorney of the fourth judicial district of Texas. He died Jan. 22, 1888.

Zachary T. Fulmore Middle School:

- The school began as a one-room wooden schoolhouse a few blocks north of the present building. Austin was a growing city; the Colorado River had finally been tamed with a dam, and a new bridge was built, uniting north and south Austin. That original school was called the South Ward School. Miss Luetta Kinney, the first teacher, taught all six grades from her homemade desk. The 12 students drank water from a dipper that came from a barrel of water drawn from the Colorado River. The school was named Fulmore in honor of Judge Zachary Taylor Fulmore, a private in the Confederate Army and County Judge of Travis County, by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Newning who donated land and materials for the school. Judge Fulmore was a businessman, a judge, and a leader in educational reform in Austin and Travis County. He was ex officio superintendent of county schools at the time of the naming of the school.
- In 1892, when the school reached enrollment of about 75, the school became part of the Austin Public School System. Miss Mollie Dawson was made the first principal. Today Dawson Elementary School carries on her name. Student enrollment grew rapidly and the addition of a new building was proposed. Fulmore is the oldest secondary school building still in use in Austin.

Sydney Lanier High School:

- Established in 1961 as the sixth high school in the Austin Independent School District, Sidney Lanier High School was originally located in the building which now houses Burnet Middle School. The school was named for Sidney Lanier, a noted poet and musician who fought for the Confederacy. Lanier, a Georgia native, practiced law with his father. He wrote an anti-war memoir about his service in the Confederate Army.
- The current facility, opened in the fall of 1966, is located on Payton Gin Road, north
 of Research Boulevard, between North Lamar Boulevard and Burnet Road. Lanier is
 the northernmost AISD high school. When originally opened, Lanier's student body
 was Caucasian. Over the years, however, the school's ethnic diversity has evolved
 to the point where Lanier more closely reflects an international population with over
 53 countries represented, making it the most diverse high school in Austin.

John H. Reagan High School

The school was named for John H. Reagan, Texas statesman, political figure and strong supporter of public schools, who rose to prominence in the late 1800's. He served in the Texas legislature and in both houses of the national congress. He was post-master general of the Confederacy under appointment of Jefferson Davis. He was the first chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission which was organized in 1891. He served in this capacity four terms, three by appointment and one by election. He is credited with lending strong support to sections of the state constitution of 1866 and 1875 which contained provision for a vast public land domain to endow public schools.

Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston Campus

- Eastside Memorial High School at the Johnston campus was named for Albert Sidney Johnston. Johnston was a U.S. and Texas military officer who served as a Confederate general during the Civil War. He was killed in 1862 at the Battle of Shiloh. He was the highest ranking fatality of the war on either side. First buried in New Orleans, his remains were transferred for burial in the Texas State Cemetery in Austin.
- A veteran of the Black Hawk War, Johnston resigned from the U.S. Army in 1834. He served in the Texas Army during the Texas Revolution and as a colonel of Texas volunteers during the Mexican-American War. He moved to Texas in 1836. He enlisted as a private in the Texian Army and rose up through the ranks; on December 22, 1838, Mirabeau B. Lamar, the second president of the Republic of Texas appointed Johnston as Secretary of War. He was reappointed to the U.S. Army in 1849 and led troops during the Utah War before joining the Confederacy at the start of the Civil War in 1861. Johnston was appointed a full general and served in the war's Western Theater as commander of all Confederate troops between Texas and the Appalachian Mountains.



Life of Allan Read Feb. 2, 1900

"The superintendent stated that Mr. Golbeck had prepared a school account of the life of John T. Allan."



The subject of this sketch, to whom the children of the City of Austin, Texas, are indebted for the magnificent bequest donated to them for the purpose of establishing for their benefit a school where scientific principles as applied to labor should be taught, was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, on the twenty-first day of May, 1821. His early education was obtained in the public schools of his native city, and in the town of Inwerness, Scotland.

At the age of twenty-one, years, young Allan, feeling the necessity of supporting himself, left his parental roof to go to the West In-dies, intending to locate at Kingston, Jamaica. On arrival of the vessel at that port, it was discovered that an epidemic of yellow fever was raging there. The captain of the schooner, fearing the fever, dis-charged what freight he had for the island in lighters and sailed for New Orleans, Louisiana, inducing young Allan to make the journey to that city and not risk his life by landing in Jamaica.

The expenses of his voyage from Scotland to America were defray-ed from the proceeds of the sale of a large number of pet birds, such as linnets, thrush and other birds, which young Allan had educated while a boy in his spare time mostly before breakfast to be excellent singers and for which he obtained from a dealer thinty normal. singers and for which he obtained from a dealer thirty pounds Sterling.

Upon his arrival at New Orleans, La., the yellow fever was also prevailing in that city, and very soon after landing, the unacclimated youth fell a victim to the fever.

It was at this time that he made the acquaintance of Mr. Daniel Clark Osborn and Dr. Warren Stone, both of whom became his warm friends and induced him, upon his recovery, to leave New Orleans and seek employment in St. Louis, Mo. But as there was no boat going up the Mississippi for ten days and a steamer was ready to leave New Orleans to go, up the Red River, he concluded to take the Red River boat and get out of the unhealthy city in short order.

Before his departure young Allan was introduced by Mr.Osborn to a friend of his who was making the journey on the same schooner, and it was through the kindness of this gentleman that he obtained employ-ment as bock-keeper and clerk on a large cotton plantation above Alexandria.

andria. From there he went to Nacogdoches, Texas and to Little Rock, Ark, arriving at Austin, Texas in 1850, where he resided, working at his trade of cabinet maker, until June 1863, when, owing to having received orders to report as Conscript to an officer of the Confederacy, he left for Louisiana. He fought in the Teche campaign on Major General Ward's staff.

He studied law in 1864, and was appointed District Attorney for the Fourth Judicial District of Louisiana in 1864, serving in that capacity until 1865, when he returned to Texas and remained there until January 26th, 1866. In 1867 he was appointed State Treasurer upon the recommendation of Covernor F.M.Pease, by the Provisional Government of Texas, General Reynolds Commander.

From that date to his death, his life as a citizen of Austin,



Allan Anniversary Is Observed Here Benefactor of Austin's Schools Born in 1821

Students of the John T. Allan high school Saturday observed the 111th anniversary of the birth of John T. Allan, benefactor of their school and founder of the John T. Allan endowment fund used to further manual training in the Austin schools.

John T. Allan was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, May 21, 1821, and came to this country at the age of 21 landing at New Orleans after making a brief stop at Jamaica.

After spending a few years in Alexandria, La., and Little Rock, Ark, Mr. Allan came to Austin in 1850 and made his permanent home here. On his arrival here, he opened a furniture store in partnership with Joseph Spence, but the furniture business (id not appeal to him. Having stud it law in Little Rock, Mr. Allan 1 1852 opened a law office in a bu...ding located on the site of the present Queen theatre building. He practiced law and served as justice of the peace in Austin until 1863. He became an officer on the staff of Major Gen. Ward during the Civil War and served for the duration of the war.

During the administration of Gov. E. M. Pease in 1867-69, Mr. Allan served as state treasurer and later was appointed district attorney of the fourth judicial district of Texas.

John T. Allan died Jan. 22, 1888, leaving an estate valued at between \$50,000 and \$100,000. All except \$50(b) of this was willed to a Miss Osborne, a daughter of his old friend, D. C. Osborne of Nacogdoches. The \$5000 was bequeathed to the city of Austin for the establishment of a school of industrial arts for boys. The Junior high school was named in his honor by the school board in recognition of this endowment.

REPORT TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

ON INTEGRATION IN

AUSTIN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

As requested by the Board of Education at its meeting on July 11, a preliminary study has been made of the possibility of integrating the negro and white students at the senior high level by the beginning of the 1955-56 school year.

Several meetings were held with the four high school principals and with the directors for the purpose of discussing this question. The concensus of the group was that due to the less crowded conditions of the senior high schools, it would be possible to begin integration at the senior high school level only in the fall of 1955.

If such is done it is recommended that:

1. For the time being, the A. N. McCallum and W. B. Travis high school districts shall remain unchanged. Out of the Stephen F. Austin High School district, two new districts should be formed; one of these districts to be designated the Anderson High School district, the second district to be located in the southeast section of Austin for which a site was purchased in 1953 on Shady Lane. The pupils from the southeast district shall continue attending the Stephen F. Austin High School until the building on the Shady Lane site is ready for occupancy, scheduled for September 1957. It should also be noted that the Board will need to create another district in northeast Austin in the foreseeable future.


2. Each high school student (grades 10, 11, 12) shall be allowed to attend the high school of the district of his residence.

3. Students living outside of the Anderson High School district may apply for transfer to attend that school. Students living within the Anderson High School district may apply for a transfer to attend some other high school. All applications for transfer shall be signed by the parents.

4. A student going to a different high school than he attended last year should present himself to his original high school where he will check his records with the principal, obtain his choice slip and make his request for transfer. This should be done during the week of August 29 to September 2, 1955.



John H. Reagan High School's new academic building will open for classes in September of 1967.

This building, presently under construction, will enlarge Reagan's capacity from 1500 to 2500 students. Next year's projected enrollment is estimated to be 1871, with a senior class of over 300 and a freshman class of over 550 students.

With added class rooms and new students, the departments will be changed in the old academic building as well. The Business Depart-

ment will be moved into the new building to accommodate the new data-processing equipment, the old business departmental rooms being used by the Science Department. Social studies, English and math will all have three departments each. The "shacks" will be moved and the health classes will have two rooms in the new building in the department with special education.

The building presently under construction will complete the master plan for Reagan.



RESOLUTION
